## Inside the Craig Tanner seminar

Craig Tanner conducted the Spring Photo Seminar on May 19 at Audubon Acres. Craig is a professional photographer that does nature photography, commercial photography and also teaches photography in Montana, Puget Sound, and Atlanta. The 26 attendees were exposed to the maker of many beautiful images whose teaching skills may equal his image making skills.

On Friday night the 18th he presented information about himself and how he became a professional photographer and showed both good and bad images that he had made. He used the bad vs. good images to shoot down the "talent myth." It is his belief that it is not talent that makes a good photographer, that it is desire. He believes that we can all learn to make beautiful and impressive photographs if we have the desire to study, learn and practice.

Topics covered were pre-visualization of images, exposure using the color zone system, composition of landscapes, filters for color photography, getting the best prints from slides and negatives, and getting published.

The first part of the day was devoted to pre-visualization and exposure with the color zone system. This was the foundation that he used later in the day to build the rest of the program around. He teaches that slide film can only record about 5 stops of light from the darkest area with detail to the lightest area with detail and suggests using a spot meter to determine the amount of light reflected from the various surfaces to determine the "right exposure" for the scene. He also recommends bracketing because the "right exposure" is the one that you like the best.

Composition and lens selection were also covered as well as time of day to get dramatic lighting. This with the use of filters such as split density filters to darken light areas of the image allows the photographer to use the color zone system to place tonal values so that important areas are not too dark in the shadows and that highlight areas are not burned out. Keeping the contrast ratio from dark to light in the proper range will produce a good slide that will also print well.

Results of the evaluation sheets sent in by the participants indicated a high degree of satisfaction with the seminar, the food provided, and the location. The Workshop Committee is to be commended for providing a well-known teaching photographer and tasty food and snacks at a reasonable price.

# The best non-photographic photography accessory you can own

Before you run out to buy that new lens, let me tell you about a gadget (and aren't all of us photographers gadget freaks) that may help you even more and in ways you would not expect.

What I'm talking about is a PDA (Personal Digital Assistant) or "Palm Computer". Mine happens to be a Handspring Visor, but it uses the Palm computing platform. When I bought mine, I planned on using it to keep my calendar and address book. I had no idea about the various software programs that were available. Because of that I started with a Visor with 2 megs of memory. I would recommend that you get a minimum of 8 megs.

If you were at the recent PSC seminar by Craig Tanner, you heard him talk about the importance of journaling, of knowing the times of twilight, sunrise and sunset, and moon phase and moonrise. There are Palm programs to help do all of this and more. Most of these programs are either freeware, or low cost shareware. Most can be found at <http://www.palmgear.com>. I have a chart of some photography and other useful programs below. All descriptions are taken from Palmgear. To use these programs, you must have access to a desktop computer, since programs are installed from your computer, using the Palmsynch program that comes with your Palm or Visor.

One program that I particularly like is "Sol! II". This gives you sunrise, sunset and twilight times for any location on any date. Go into information, choose "now position" and adjust the time and date, and you can find out the compass bearing and angle above the horizon where the sun will be. This is very useful for pictures where you want the sun in certain part of the picture, or for knowing where shadows will be at a certain time. So your camera bag should include a compass, and if you want to be accurate, there is an angle finder you can buy at a building supply store to find the angle from the horizon. All of this really takes the luck out of being in the right place in the right light.

There are two moon programs that I use. For a quick look at moon phases, I use "Moon" (version 1.7). It shows a calendar month, with the moon phase for each day. It doesn't have detailed information on moonrise times, age, etc. For that I use "Moon Info" version 2.0.

For vacation that includes snorkeling, diving, or even beach photography, knowing the times for high and low tides can be very useful. "Tide Tool" version 2.0 and its accompanying data files will give a graphical chart of the daily tides for any given coastal area.

I have yet to try any of the record keeping applications for photography, but I have listed several potentially useful ones in the chart below.

After having my Visor for only a week, I wondered how I ever did without it. I would never go on a shoot without it, and neither should you.

## **PhotoFriend Amateur V. 1.0 (Freeware)**

PhotoFriend is a very useful tool for the usage of both amateurs and Pro's ... It consists of 3 main parts : Shot / My Camera / My Notes. Shot has information about actual shot performed by the camera. These are camera info, objective, type of film, light sensitivity, number of exposures, snapshot info and notes ...By using My Camera, you can track information about your cameras and your complete photography set. By tracking this, user has an advantage for knowing what he has and choosing the right single item. My Notes has fields to control the future projects about photography.

## **FotoLog 2.1 (Shareware \$9.95)**

FotoLog is a finger navigated tracking tool of your photoshoots. It logs date, exposure (aperture, shutter speed, lens focus) as well as your comments (exposure compensation, weather condition or just shot description) for one shot and for the total film. Large controls make usage easier in the field conditions.

## **f/Calc 1.14 (Shareware \$8.00)**

f/Calc is a calculator for photographic formulas. These formulas are at the heart of many interesting questions about the technical side of photography. You could compute these functions by hand, but they range from tedious to difficult, even with a good scientific calculator.

When you let f/Calc do the hard work, you gain an intuitive feel for what the results mean, because you can quickly try new input values to see how they affect the result.

f/Calc can calculate:

1. f number arithmetic (e.g. f/2.8 plus 2.5 stops, or f/3.5 minus f/1.4)
2. Depth of field
3. Hyperfocal distance
4. Field of view
5. Angle of view
6. Magnification
7. Spot meter view angle

**PhotoNotes 1.0 (Shareware \$5.00)**

PhotoNotes is a fully editable database program that allows you to keep notes on your photographs. Using PhotoNotes you can easily look back and see how you made that great or not so great photo. Uses 17k of RAM + memory for the database. \*Requires NSBasic Runtime(88k). This is included in the download. You only need to install it if you do not already have it.

**pFlash! 1.11 (Shareware \$10.00)**

pFLASH! is an easy to use, configurable photography's flash calculator.  
Configurable up to 10 flash. Each flash can have maximum 6 Q mode for different GN.

**Focus+ 1.51 (Shareware \$14.95)**

Depth of field calculator for all photographers. Tabulates hyperfocal and near/far or front/back distances by aperture. Computes optimum focus distance and aperture for specified near and far distances. Designed for fast use in the field. Features include multiple formats, unlimited lenses and fractional stops. Supports monochrome and color displays.

**Vade Mecum 1.3 (Freeware)**

45 functions to make most calculations needed by practicing photographers, with special emphasis on large format. There are 9 functions for DOF, 4 for tilt angle, 2 for bellows factors, etc. There are miscellaneous functions for AOV, speed to stop motion, resolution, etc. In addition to the documentation, detailed technical notes may be downloaded from <ftp://208.219.63.253/public/photo>.

**Picture Log 01-01 (Freeware)**

This application can be used to record information about individual photographs. Details such as exposure, location, camera, and others may be recorded and stored.

**Sol! II (Shareware \$9.95)**

Sun Rise and Sun Set calculator for any geographic location on the planet Calculates start and end of Civil, Nautical, Astronomical Twilight Computes length of day, length of day with twilights Shows position of the Sun in ecliptic, equatorial and horizon coordinate systems Computes maximum amount of darkness for planning your observing sessions The program optionally uses the Location Manager by Star Pilot Technologies to give it unlimited locations

**Moon Info! 2.0.0 (Shareware \$9.95)**

a program for calculating the phase (text and graphical), percent illumination, rise, set, and dates of the major quarters of the moon. Additional information of interest to both observational and "arm-chair" astronomers is available in the program. Check out the on-line documentation for sample screen shots and additional information.

**Moon 1.7 (Shareware \$5.00)**

Moon phase calendar

**Tide Tool 2.1a (Freeware)**

Tide Tool displays tide and current graphs and tables for over 6100 locations worldwide. Displays times of sunrise/sunset and moonrise/moonset, and moon phases. Covers years 1998 to 2031. User-selectable units of height and speed.

# Tips on presenting slide shows

Have you seen slide shows that were so dull and boring that they literally put you to sleep? Here are some ways to avoid doing that to your audience:

- Use a slide screen. Walls and sheets will do in a pinch but for quality showings a slide screen designed for projection will give the best results.
- Purchase a good quality slide projector.
- Use special bulbs that are super bright when projecting in a large room.
- The bright light from the projector tends to fade slides. Project duplicates when possible to preserve originals.
- If you do a multi-projection dissolve show with music, be sure the slides mesh well and synchronize with the music.
- Avoid shows longer than one-hour in length. Audiences fatigue after sitting that long.
- Present a maximum of 80 slides. Limit yourself by using trays that hold only 80 slides.
- Tell a story with your presentation. Include interesting

facts about the subject.

- Make your presentation about your destination rather than your family. Limit the number of slides showing family and friends.
- Use only your very best slides. Quality presentations will assure that you have an audience next time.
- Dull slides make for dull presentations. Include slides that are bright and project well.
- Run through your show once or twice and remove questionable slides that are of lesser quality or less importance to the topic as a whole.
- End your presentation with strong images. Audiences tend to remember the last images that they see and may judge your whole presentation on that criteria.
- You may want to use your last images to recap or summarize the whole presentation.
- Next time, practice shooting with it in mind that you are going to do a slide show after the fact. Your presentations will be more interesting.

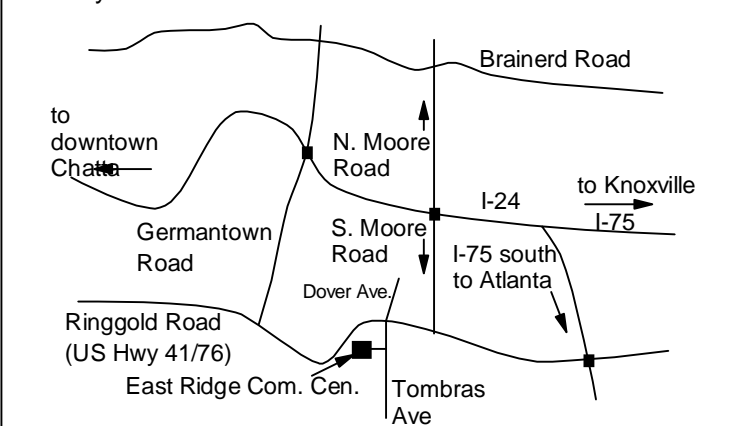
